# Research collaboration with external partners

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### Points of departure

- There are hardly generically 'bad partners / countries
- Societal implications of new knowledge and technologies co-depend on context
- Hence: decisions on collaboration are a matter of
  - judgement
  - taking into account context

### Case: collaboration with fossil industries the context

### Context:

- Energy transition, i.e. a profound transformation of society and economy to ensure long term 'broad welfare'
  - (collaboration between knowledge and) fossil industry has historically brought significant socioeconomic benefits => climate <u>and</u> social-economic urgency
  - urgent, but not overnight: fossil energy while renewable energy
  - fossil industries have tremendous potential (money, knowledge, networks) to contribute and to delay / obstruct
- Climate change:
  - Increasing public awareness => strong sense of urgency, especially amongst the youg
    - in society, at universities and within fossil corporations
    - N-dimensional problem: accountability (incl 'greenwashing'), public support, human resources
  - Increasing authoritative pressures: divestment by institutional funds; court cases; IPCC
- Fossil industries ambiguous/hesitant; new industries emerging but little leverage

### Case: collaboration with fossil industries the key question for judgement

### Question:

Can collaboration with fossil industries promote energy transition (renewable up & fossil down), and continue to contribute to broad welfare?

### Context:

- ambiguous
- relations / dependencies are dynamic

## Lessons from the case

- Easy:
  - only collaborate on renewables
  - assess & pro-actively/autonomously establish collaboration from ET perspective
- Context: <u>matters</u> & <u>ambiguous</u>, => contextual changes matter too, e.g.
  - provisions to ensure swift dissemination and application
  - make societal urgency / HR issue etc a joint concern, addressed in the collaboration
  - Maximum transparency, may be coupled to novel accountability arrangement
- Not so easy:
  - address some societal arguments, like 'greenwashing'
  - divisional issue
  - strategically deal with changing context and mutual relations
